Film and Media

Courses	Professor/Course Description	
Korean Cinema Plus: Remakes, Revenge, Rebellion (3crs)	Prof. Jae Soh	
Session 1 09:00-12:30	Embark on a captivating cinematic journey through the rich tapestry of Korean cinema in "Korean Cinema Plus: Remakes, Revenge, Rebellion." This course delves into the dynamic interplay of remakes, revenge narratives, and themes of rebellion in Korean cinema, showcasing iconic films that span over 104 years of the nation's cinematic evolution. Through a combination of lectures, immersive film screenings, and thought-provoking discussions, students will gain insights into the creative and commercial rebirth of Korean cinema. Immerse yourself in the art of storytelling, visual aesthetics, and cultural representation as we explore the remakes, revenge tales, and rebellious narratives that have defined Korean cinema's contribution to global film culture. Open your eyes to the creativity, innovation, and socio-political resonance that have shaped the cinematic landscape of Korea.	
Korean Popular Culture (3crs)	Prof. Chang Rae Kim	
Session 2 09:00-12:30	This class is designed to encourage the student to develop the skills of analysis, critical reading, and self-expression. It aims to introduce students to cultivate an appreciation of Korean film, TV drama and music as a complex form of popular culture. The class involves film/video screening, class discussions, reports, in-class analysis exercises and written assignments. Various forms of Korean popular culture, with a special emphasis on films, will be selected to illustrate diverse styles and approaches to film/TV/music-making. The class will also look more deeply at the nature of popular culture itself, its social meanings and the intertextual relationship of individual text and cultural industries with the audience.	
Korean Dystopia: From Parasite to Squid Game (3crs)	Prof. Jason Bechervaise	
Session 1 14:30-18:00	This course will offer a guided introduction to Korea's most resilient genres of the human imagination: dystopian content. Like survivors of a zombie apocalypse huddled around a campfire, we will turn to cinema and dramas to debate some of the big questions about the future of Korea's socio-political issues, technology, and capitalism. This course is designed as a critical speaking seminar which includes lectures, film viewings with portions of the class devoted to oral presentations and discussions. We will track the changing nature of Korean dystopian content: from movies like Train to Busan and Parasite to serial dramas like Hellbound and Squid Game. By the end of course, students will have a firm grasp of the history of the genre and will be

able to draw on this knowledge to effectively debate issues related to Korean society, popular culture, geo-political history, and Hallyu (Korean Wave).

Comparative Studies on World	Prof. Tim Bergfelder
Cinema (3crs)	Prof. Byran Konefsky
Session 2 14:30-18:00	This course offers a comparative introduction into three different film cultures, European cinema, American cinema and Mainland Chinese cinema. The course will provide a systematic historical and thematic overview of the main developments and characteristics of the three film cultures. The course will consist of three blocks of three lectures each, accompanied by class discussion and the screening of relevant films. At the end of the module, we will actively seek to highlight the differences and interconnections between the three film cultures. One of our aims is to show how there have always been exchanges and dialogues between different film cultures, and as an example, we will see how the genre of the "Western" has been adapted in different contexts.

Korean Language and Culture

Courses	Professor/Course Description	
Korean Language & Culture (3crs) Basic	Dongguk University Korean Language Center	
Session 1, 2 09:00-12:30	The objective of this course is for students to read and write Korean consonants and vowels completely and understand basic sentence structure, tense expression, and usage of verbs and adjectives. This course will help students to build basic Korean communication skills for daily lives and understand Korean culture with its local experience.	
Korean Language & Culture (3crs) Intermediate	Dongguk University Korean Language Center	
Session 1, 2 14:30-18:00	The objective of this course is for students to pronunciate under phonological and pronunciation rules. Depending on the situation, students can understand when to use formal or informal expressions. This course will help students to compose sentences using various connecting words and express Korean naturally with the use of verbal and indirect speech.	
Music of Korea: From Traditional Music to K-pop (3crs)	Prof. Jeong Hyeon Joo	
Session 1 09:00-12:30	This course provides a comprehensive overview of Korean music, spanning from traditional to contemporary genres and practices. Daily topics will vary from traditional gugak to recent music genres, such as K-pop, indie music, experimental music, trot, and film music. Students will explore sociological contexts, cultural backgrounds, compositional ideas, and performance styles through lectures, group discussions, listening, reading, and creative activities.	

Business and Engineering

Courses	Professor/Course Description	
Lead Better: Leadership Skills Workshop in 1:1 Management (3crs)	Prof. Karin McDonald	
Session 1 09:00-12:30	Empowering techniques to Manage, People, Projects, and Innovation will develop the key interpersonal management and communication skills and understanding in order to confidently and successfully function in a school or business environment using time and self-management, active listening, facilitation, and motivational criticism techniques. This is not a lecture course. This is a student-centered participation course so students should be comfortable communicating in English. Students will learn: how to understand the current management environment, how to manage time and emotions effectively, how to listen like a manager, how to resolve conflicts, how to manage projects, how to create quality new ideas, how to sell a good idea, how to get buy-in.	
Design Thinking Meets the Real Business World (Capstone Design) (3crs)	Prof. Sue Hyun Lee	
Session 1 14:30-18:00	The purpose of this course is for the students to apply theoretical knowledge acquired during this summer semester. During the project, students engage in the entire process of solving the real-world problems from collecting and processing actual data along with suitable and appropriate analytic methods to the problem. Both the problem statements and the datasets originate from real-world domains similar to those that students might typically encounter within industry or academic research.	

Buddhism and Meditation

Courses	Professor/Course Description	
Buddhism and Buddhist Practices (3crs)	Prof. Soon II Hwang	

Session 2 09:00-12:30	Buddhism has played a major role in the Korean thought and culture since its transmission at around the 5th century CE. In order to understand Korean Culture, it is important to understand what Buddhism may be and how it has developed from early to modern period. This lecture surveys Buddhist thought and culture from the ancient India to the modern Korea to provide the general picture of Korean Buddhism and the Buddhist culture. It also provides opportunities to visit various Korean Buddhist temples and important museums to experience Korean Buddhist culture and heritage.
Cultivating Healthy Mind and Body with Meditation (3crs)	Hyeju Sunim
Session 2 14:30-18:00	This course covers a wide spectrum of Buddhist meditation practices, including mindfulness meditation, concentration meditation, and Seon (Zen/Chan). Students will learn how to approach Buddhist meditation practices and explore how to practice them. By learning to understand their selves and interconnectedness among all beings, students will be able to observe how their mind works and explore how to live in harmony with all other beings with healthy and compassionate mind. This course will also discuss the global movement of meditation practices and the benefits of practicing meditation for well-being. Students will learn to apply these meditation practices to their daily lives.

Criminal Justice & Law

Comparative Criminal Justice System and Practices (3crs)	Prof. Youn Oh Cho Prof. Seungmug (Zech) Lee	
Session 1	The course is designed to provide the systematic overview of comparative criminal justice systems (law, police, courts, and corrections) between the U.S.A. and S. Korea. Through a comprehensive comparison and contrast of both countries' criminal justice systems and practices, this course


